2. The Zika virus in hard-hit Brazil, arguing that the shift would make no significant difference to the spread of the virus. (Main, A2)
3. They killed the gorilla because it grabbed and dragged a 4-year-old boy who fell into the gorilla exhibit moat, zoo Director Thane Maynard said. Authorities said the boy, who fell 10 to 12 feet, was expected to recover after being picked up out of the moat and dragged by the gorilla for about 10 minutes. Maynard said the zoo team that practices for such events decided the boy was in “a life-threatening situation” and that it needed to put down the 400-pound-plus male gorilla, Harambe. It was unclear how the boy, who was not identified, fell into the moat. (Main, A2)
