Learning Objectives

- Students will cite text evidence from multiple sources to support a stance on plagiarism.
- Students will analyze multiple sources to create a functional understanding of plagiarism and how it can be avoided.

Warm Up: What is plagiarism?

Then find and read at least two additional articles that discuss other examples of plagiarism, or what plagiarism is (your teacher may wish to provide these to you). You might want to start by researching some of the other examples of plagiarism that were mentioned in The Seattle Times articles.

Write On:

Write a short essay discussing the following: Do you believe that Melania Trump's speech is an example of plagiarism? Why or why not? To what extent do you believe plagiarism matters?
