1.	Some are offended, others inspired, and many of us are left wondering what's next in
	athletes' protests of racial inequality and police brutality during the national anthem as the
	Seahawks kick off their season Sunday and the nation commemorates the 15th
	anniversary of 9/11. What is your opinion regarding this issue?

- 2. Will team owners use pre-emptive strikes like the Washington Spirit did Wednesday, playing the anthem before players left the locker rooms, denying Seattle soccer star Megan Rapinoe a chance to take what the Spirit called a "disrespectful" knee?
- 3. Who is the NFL player that ignited these protests?
- 4. What did the Seahawks plan, for their team-wide statement?
- 5. Others, such as Garfield High School football players, spent the week talking about whether to make a statement before their game Saturday afternoon, according to Coach Joey Thomas. What did they decide to do?
- 6. The city of Dupont in Pierce County canceled its third annual Seahawks rally that was scheduled for Saturday. Why?
- 7. The tradition of standing during the national anthem has some roots here in the Pacific Northwest. When did it begin and where?
- 8. Protests by athletes are not new, either. What happened at the 1968 Olympics and who were they inspired by?

#### **Group Discussion Questions or Extension Essay Questions:**

- When an athlete takes a knee during the national anthem, is the silent protest disrespectful or thoughtful?
- Will the movement gain momentum, with whole squads such as the Seahawks contemplating group protests? Or will the team instead, as receiver Doug Baldwin tweeted, "honor the country and flag" and find some middle ground?
- But the Seahawks are planning a team-wide statement, which could be a gamechanger in a league where two-thirds of the players are black and where, some say, white owners occasionally resemble plantation masters from "Django Unchained" looking down from luxury boxes at black gladiators. Why would the author of this article say this? Has this thought ever crossed your mind? Is this hierarchy racially motivated or is it simply a bi-product of capitalism?
- Some will find protests all the more distasteful on 9/11 because of the idea they disrespect the U.S. military, which has secured our freedom to watch games and express dissent. What do you think about these protests? Have you talked with your friends about it? Have you talked to your parents or other family members? Military friends or family? What are the opinions you're hearing from your social circles? Do you agree or disagree with them?

- 5. Ultimately, the anthem wasn't played before that game, as it wasn't the first of the day in Memorial Stadium.
- 6. "This does not mean that I or the city do not support the causes being championed, we simply do not support the protest actions being contemplated," said Mayor Mike Courts.
- 7. In 1893, Army Gen. Rossell O'Brien, a Civil War veteran, made a motion at a meeting in Tacoma that all should stand at attention during the "Star-Spangled Banner." A local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution later hung a plaque on the Bostwick Building in Tacoma toasting O'Brien for starting the custom, although others credit statesman Daniel Webster with launching the tradition decades earlier.
- 8. U.S. sprinters John Carlos and Tommie Smith stood on the medal platform and raised gloved fists in a black power salute against racial injustice. They said they were inspired by Muhammad Ali.
