4. New evidence had been discovered that may be related to the completed Hillary Clinton email investigation, the Justice Department strongly discouraged the step and told him he would be breaking with longstanding policy, three law-enforcement officials said Saturday. (MAIN, A1)
5. The Urban Death Project-she imagined a stories-tall, chapel-like building in the city where bodies could be laid to rest in a mix of other organic matter (wood chips, alfalfa, straw) and become nutrient-rich soil. At the end of the weeks-long process, loved ones could return — not to gather ashes, but mulch. (MAIN, A1)
6. A powdery substance a man sprinkled into the orchestra pit at New York's Metropolitan Opera may have been an opera lover's ashes, police said Saturday. Police said the powder would be tested, but that several audience members said the man, not a New York resident, told them he was there to sprinkle the ashes of a friend, his mentor in the opera.
