1. The apartment-building parking space. (MAIN, A1)
2. An unleashed immune system can attack healthy, vital organs, notably the bowel, the liver and the lungs, but also the kidneys, the adrenal and pituitary glands, the pancreas and, in rare cases, the heart. (MAIN, A2)
