Objective:

Building Language Skills:

Visualizing text is a proven way that improves reading comprehension. Have students close their eyes and listen carefully. Have them think deeply about the words described in the statement.

The teacher will read the following information to the class, taken from the article.

"An investment in knowledge always pays the best interest." -Benjamin Franklin

Have students share their thoughts. What images did you visualize? What emotions or thoughts arise? Do you agree or disagree with Franklin's quote?

<u>In-Class Activity:</u> Print out page 4 for your students. Have them complete the worksheet "Can you Hack it in the Real World?" Discuss with the class after. What were their findings?

Post-Reading Class Discussion or Journal Writing Assignment:

- Have you talked about college with your parents? How it will be paid for?
- After reading this article, what things stood out to you in terms of preparing for college and the workplace?
- Do you live within your means? Do your parents? What are their spending habits?
- Do you know someone that doesn't live within their means, but spends too much? Are they happier because they have more material items? How does debt generally impact people?
- Were you surprised to learn the cost of replacing 4 tires? Why or why not?
