1. Tens of thousands of demonstrators filled the streets last month to protest a decision by Aung San Suu Kyi's government to name a new bridge after whom? (MAIN)
2. What happened in the 1942 Bataan Death March in the Philippines? (MAIN)
3. A generation ago, this was mostly farmland. Three vital rivers leading to the South China Sea, along with crisscrossing tributaries, made the low-lying delta a fertile plain, famous for rice. Guangzhou, formerly Canton, had more than 1 million people, but by the 1980s, China set out to transform the whole region.

Rushing to catch up after decades of stagnation, China built a gargantuan collection of cities the size of nations with barely a pause to consider their toll on what? What is the estimated population of this area now? (MAIN)

4. For anyone who digs geology, the Pacific Northwest is better than _____, says Nick Zentner. You want mountains? We've got more than 60,000 square miles of them. Volcanoes? Half a dozen snowcapped cones tower over our patch of the Pacific Ring of Fire. East of the Cascades, fantastical falls and coulees mark the path of some of the most powerful floods in the planet's history.
