Article: MILLENNIALS REVERSE CAR OWNERSHIP TREND

Comprehension Questions:

- 1. Census data show that from 2010 to 2015, the percentage of Seattle households that own a vehicle _____ that's noteworthy because it's something that hasn't happened in decades.
- 2. Car-ownership rates have creeped up every 10 years, right through to 2010. That year, _____ percent of city households owned at least one vehicle.
- 3. But suddenly, that number is dropping. As of 2015, it's down by about 1 percentage point. And that's almost entirely because of one group. What group is it?
- 4. At the start of this decade, someone under the age of 35 was just as likely to own a car as anyone else in Seattle. Five years later, car ownership among the city's young had declined by about _____ percentage points.
- 5. In fact, among the 50 largest U.S. cities, none saw a bigger drop in the ownership rate among millennials in this period than what city?
- 6. For Seattle households headed by someone age 35 and up, was there a change in the rate of ownership?
- 7. The data suggests that young newcomers to the city are, more often than not, choosing to what?
- 8. It's a combination of economics and priorities, says Mark Hallenbeck, director of the Washington State Transportation Center at the University of Washington. What did he say?
- 9. Of course, that's partly because it's much easier to get by without owning a car than it used to be. Why? What's changed?
- 10. Hallenbeck says that younger people don't place the same value on car ownership as older generations, who still rely on the automobile as a means of social connectedness. What do Millennials have?

- Does your family have a car? How many?
- Does your family rely on public transportation? Who takes it? Why?
- Does any member of your family walk or bike to work on a daily basis?
- Has your family ever used an UBER or LYFT to get somewhere? Was it easy to use?
- Can you see why young people, under 30 want to go carless and have more money to spend on other things?
- Would you want a car in your 20's and 30's? Why or why not?
- Do you think Seattle's declining car ownership will continue to be on the rise? Why or why not?
- What are the financial incentives to not owning a car?
