Objectives:

Students will access their prior knowledge about elephant behavior and lifestyle. They will discuss why they think China has allowed this heard to roam freely, why they embarked on this journey and why they think the lone male is 10 miles away from its herd? Students will brainstorm 3 ideas for keeping these wild animals safe?

"The increase of human elephant conflicts reflects the urgency for a more strategic policy and plan to protect these endangered wild animals and their natural habitats," Sun wrote in an email. "This also poses a great opportunity to educate the public about the challenges that wild animals face for survival and the need for better protection from a government, industry and society level," Sun wrote. "These animals belong in the wild. We need to keep a safe distance from them, which is good for us and the wild animals."
