1. Pakistan's _____ laws, which can already mean death for those deemed to have insulted Islam or the Prophet Muhammad, can now also be used to punish anyone convicted of insulting people who were connected to him. (MAIN)
2. Astronaut Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin announced on Facebook that he has married his "longtime love" in a small ceremony in Los Angeles. Aldrin, who made history along with Neil Armstrong as the first humans to set foot on the surface of the moon, said the wedding took place Friday, which was his _____rd birthday. "I am pleased to announce that my longtime love and partner, Dr. Anca V Faur, and I have tied the knot. The Culture Ministry said it had closed the country's most famous tourist attraction as well as the Inca Trail leading up to the site "to protect the safety of tourists and the population in general." Unrest has engulfed large portions of the country since former President Pedro Castillo was impeached and imprisoned.
