5. Pandemonium aptly describes the conclusion of Gonzaga's last conference home game with rival St. Mary's College. Not the contest on the hardwood, but the scene that unfolded in front of the McCarthy Athletic Center in Spokane, after the final buzzer. As part of a promotion, fans as they left the arena were handed One Piece collectibles, including a collector's \_\_\_\_\_ that has unexpectedly become highly valuable, fetching several hundred dollars apiece when resold online. Outside, more than two dozen One Piece fans, collectors and scalpers sought to separate those fans from the cards. And because many fans had no idea of the value of the cards, some parted with them for \$50 or less. (NW)

9. The average credit card rate is about 22%, according to the Federal Reserve. But people with tarnished credit or a history of late payments can pay much higher rates — around 30%. Card delinquencies started to “flatten” last year, the Fed said. But balances rose to \$1.23 trillion in the third quarter, up 5.75% from the same period in 2024. More people have balances on their cards, with the average amount just over \$\_\_\_\_\_, the credit bureau TransUnion reported in November. (BUSINESS)
